The Dalrymple Lecture Fund

The first Lecture Series was delivered in 1907, and recent speakers have included, Dr Chris Stringer, Professor Sir Barry Cunliffe, Ian Hodder, Professor Mike Parker Pearson, Professor William Hanson and Professor Roger Stalley.

The Mystery of John P Gibson

At the end of the GAS outing to Hexham Abbey last year, the group I was with was asked by our guide Hugh if we knew anything about Mr John P Gibson of Battlehill, Hexham who he believed had been given Honorary membership of GAS in 1909. As archivist I said I would investigate, and it was relatively straightforward to confirm to Hugh that JP Gibson had indeed been given GAS Honorary Membership. As is usual in these cases, an initial question leads to follow-ups and Hugh asked me for further information:

"Thank you very much indeed for taking the trouble to check on J P Gibson's association with the Glasgow Archaeological Society. I am delighted to hear that he was indeed an Honorary Member and that this was not some local exaggeration or mistake. It would interesting to know why he was so honoured by your Society. JPG was a pharmacist, photographer, Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London, also curiously a freeman of the City of London. He was closely associated with Canon E Sydney Savage, the Rector, and Charles Clement Hodges, architect and antiquarian in the reordering of Hexham Abbey and the rebuilding of the nave to designs by Temple Moore. JPG's photographs are an important record of all that occurred from the late 19th century through until the Great War. He also wrote for Archaeologia Aeliana including a study of the Abbey's bells. He was described as 'late' by 1913 (but I hope we can be more precise about the date of his death). It is a bit confusing that his son, John, was also much involved with Hodges and Abbey and also a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London. His brother was the Great War poet, Wilfrid Wilson Gibson. The front of their shop survives with elaborate carvings by the same Belgian Great War refugee who carved the Abbey's font canopy. The interior of the shop was so spectacular that it was acquired for the Science Museum, London.

Much of their photograph collection is now in the Northumbrian Archives (formerly Country Record Office) at Woodhorn Colliery site between Newcastle and Morpeth. The photos, because so many were rescued by the heroic former Keeper, Robin Gard, are not well or comprehensively catalogued. It occurs to me, however, that the collection might include late Victorian photographs of Glasgow. If so, I suppose it is possible that the Honorary Membership could be related to photography. I will see if I can find anything.

It was great to meet you and the members of your group. Thank you again for your help. Warmest good wishes from the Tyne valley Hugh Dixon. Chairman, Hexham Abbey Conservation Advisory Group"

It was an interesting question, why would someone like JP Gibson be given honorary membership of GAS and it required a more detailed reading of the archives. Investigating further proved to be particularly interesting to me as it turned out that Gibson may well have been involved in the visit of the Newcastle Society to the Antonine Wall in 1908 and the subsequent return visit of GAS to Newcastle in 1909. As President in 2009 I had the privilege of welcoming our Newcastle contemporaries to the Antonine Wall in a centenary celebration of that first visit. David Breeze and I as Presidents of the respective organisations had the pleasure of cutting a celebratory cake!





I was therefore very pleased to be able to reply to Hugh with further information from our archives:

"At a meeting of GAS Council in October 1908, it was noted that a visit of the Society of Antiquaries of

Newcastle Upon Tyne to the Antonine Wall on Friday 10th April had been successful and the Societies resolved to exchange Journals. President George Neilson suggested the election of Mr J P Gibson of the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle as an Honorary Member and the matter was continued for consideration till the next Council meeting. This took place on 21 December 1908 when the nomination was approved and it was resolved to recommend his election at the next meeting of the Society and to ask Mr Gibson to provide a paper. Mr Gibson wrote accepting the nomination on 21 January 1909 and subsequently gave a paper on "Recent Excavations in Northumberland on the line of Hadrian's Wall and Watling Street" (with100 lantern illustrations) on 18 March 1909. In May of 1909 an invitation came from Newcastle for GAS members to take part in an excursion to the Roman Wall and Antiquities near Newcastle. During my Presidency of GAS (2006-2009) I arranged for a visit of the Newcastle Society members to the Antonine Wall to celebrate the Centenary of these earlier links.

It looks like Gibson was a senior figure in the Newcastle Society at the time of the visits and that may be why the honorary membership was given but Neilson wrote on the Solway and may have known Gibson for other work as well. Hopefully this has cleared up the little mystery you asked about when GAS visited the Abbey!"

Our archives are a wonderful resource for the Society but it was particularly pleasing to be able to help someone from another organisation solve a little mystery!

Summer Excursions 2020 First Summer Excursion - Saturday 13th June 2020

On our first summer excursion members will visit **Arbroath Abbey**, the substantial remains of a Tironensian monastery, founded by William the Lion in 1178. After lunch we will head half a mile north of the town to St. Vigeans. Here we will see the **St. Vigeans Sculptured Stones**, a fine collection of thirty-two early Christian and Pictish stones which are housed in cottages in the village. Our last stop of the day will be **Edzell Castle**, located six miles north of Brechin. It is a remarkable and very beautiful complex with a late-medieval tower house incorporated into a 16th century courtyard mansion. We expect to be back in Glasgow by **8.30p.m**.

There will be two pick-up points for this excursion. The first will be **8:00 a.m**. from Milngavie Station. Our Allander Coach will then make its way to Glasgow University. The coach will leave from the foot of University Avenue (opposite the Boyd Orr Building) at **8:30a.m**.

All sites visited on this excursion are under the guardianship of Historic Environment Scotland.

The cost for Historic Environment Scotland Members will be £23. The cost for non-members of HES £47 (adult) or £41 (concession).

Second Summer Excursion – Saturday, 29th August 2020

Our first stop of the day will be **Blackness Castle**, a fortress on a promontory in the Forth estuary. Built in the 1440's it was massively strengthened in the 16th century. We will then make our way to the town of **Linlithgow** where an experienced and knowledgeable guide will take us on a walking tour of the historic town. After lunch we will travel to The **House of The Binns** in West Lothian, the seat of the Dalyell family, which dates from the 17th century. We expect to be back in Glasgow for **7.30p.m**.

There will be two pick-up points for this excursion. The first will be **8:00 a.m**. from Milngavie Station. Our Allander Coach will then make its way to Glasgow University. The coach will leave from the foot of University Avenue (opposite the Boyd Orr Building) at **8:30a.m**.


SCOTTISH ARCHAEOLOGICAL JOURNAL

The Mann the Myth conference

1869-2019

A very successful day conference, sponsored by GAS and the archaeology department of the University of Glasgow, was held on Saturday 5th October 2019 in the Glasgow University Union debating chamber. We also benefited from support by the archaeology department student society, and Glasgow Life. The conference was organised to mark the 150th anniversary of the birth of Glasgow's great eccentric antiguarian and amateur archaeologist Ludovic Mclellan Mann (1869-1955). A controversial figure during his lifetime, Mann nonetheless carried out important (or at least popular) excavations, and for a time in the 1930s was president of GAS. This was a chance to explore a range of examples of his diverse interests and writing, and evaluate his legacy.

The conference was attended by almost 70 delegates, and they were treated to a day of fascinating talks about a wide range of aspects of the life and times of Ludovic Mann. This was kicked off by with an emotional and insightful talk by George Applebey, whose father of the same name was a friend and colleague of Mann. George was able to share personal memories of Mann, who he met as a child, as well as some of the other characters that worked with Ludovic. Following this Katinka Dalglish, of Glasgow Life, was able to share her broad knowledge of Mann's life and works, based on her own research of Mann's collections held at her museum and in other archives.

Throughout the rest of the day contributions covered an eclectic range of topics, as one would expect in relation to the research of Mann, from the supposed Covenanter jacket found in a peat bog at Cambusnethan, to prehistoric weights and measures. GAS archivist Jim Mearns explored Mann's work through newspaper clippings (of which thousands were produced). Other speakers addressed Mann as an early public archaeologist, and the original rescue archaeologist, and overlaps with the work of Harry Bell, another well-known character to GAS members, were touched on by several speakers. The yew trees and wee Celtic heids of the Clyde Valley were weaved into the Mann narrative, alongside an exploration of some rather weird Pictish symbols. The day ended with a touching performance of an original piece of writing about Mann by Gavin MacGregor, and a panel discussion on Mann's legacy chaired by Stuart Jeffrev.

All delegates who attended were given a one-off zine (a small hand-made comic) designed for the occasion, as well as the usual conference pack, with GAS members getting access at a reduced bargain price of £5. The conference organisers (Kenny Brophy, Katinka Dalglish, Jim Mearns) are at the time of writing starting the editing process to produce a special edition of GAS with papers from the conference and other Mann material, hopefully to be available by the end of 2020.
